NOTES OF RIVENHALL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 2<sup>ND</sup> JANUARY 2024 IN RIVENHALL VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllrs Turner (Chairman), Macrae, Abbott, Wright,

**Apologies:** Cllr Cairns

Chairman's Report: There was significant confusion over the recycling collection over the Christmas period, and some collections started before 7:00 am. This resulted in sacks not being collected and being torn and blown in the subsequent gales. The Rivenhall Oak fingerpost sign has blown down in the gales. There is much debris on the road on the Rivenhall side of the rail bridge due to a road traffic incident. There have been reports of suspicious activity on the grounds of the closed Rivenhall Hotel. The Chairman spoke at the Rivenhall solar farm appeal to oppose the development: The Council was later informed that the planning inspector had approved this development. The Chairman has filmed all the regular flooding places in the village to add pressure for urgent actions by ECC Highways.

**ECC Councillor report:** Oak Road near the railway bridge - further survey work will be done in January including a three-day road closure to undertake repairs. Further Rickstones Road repairs are also planned. Essex County Council is pressing for 20mph zones in residential areas.

**BDC Councillor Report:** Braintree DC will be introducing its subscription-based garden waste collections from 04 March 2024. All "side waste" i.e. not in a bag/bin/caddy will no longer be collected, and fines may be given to offending households. Frustration was expressed over Essex CC's inaction over the big pothole in Rickstones Road and the flooding at the railway bridge. The Solar Farm was given approval following the recent Appeal. Cllr Abbott did not support the application.

**Rivenhall Airfield Waste Site**: The various site determinations will be decided as follows - Woodhouse Farm complex (BDC), the DCP to increase electricity output (Government), Waste site buildings (ECC), Use of Woodhouse Lane (ECC), new haulage road over the River Blackwater (ECC), proposed greenhouses (ECC). Waste incineration is scheduled to commence in November 2025.

**Highway maintenance**: Fallen triple finger post at The Oak. Chevron signs in Church Road have blown down. Sign by railway bridge is damaged and leaning.

Ringway damaged verge play area in St. Mary's Road - inform BDC.

**Planning Applications**: 23/02789/HH - 2 Rivenhall Fields, Rickstones Road. Two storey rear extension and pitched roof to flat roof on existing extension - No objections.

**Rivenhall End Noticeboard**: the repair is substantially complete.

**Coleman's Quarry**: the next liaison meeting is 14<sup>th</sup> March. Most Rivenhall residents oppose the proposed processing plant move to Appleford Farm because this will massively increase HGVs on Braxted Road which is already a dangerous, rat-run on a B-road with broken drainage. Some

HGVs are unlawfully using the weight-limited part of Oak Road. The wheel-wash is not being regularly used and considerable quantities of mud and sand are being deposited on local roads.

**Budget and Precept for 2024/2025:** Councillors agreed a budget of £19,720 for 2024/2025; this will be a £15,220 Precept demand, meaning a Rivenhall Band D property will pay £48.23 for the year.

### **Rivenhall Parish Council notes in this magazine**

These are not formal Minutes but a simplified, very much shortened set of notes which hopefully are understandable to casual village readers. The formal Minutes can be viewed on the village noticeboards and through the Rivenhall Parish Council website.

The Editor received a complaint about one note not matching the exact words in the Minutes of the December meeting. Minute 2.5.1.2 read:-

### Re-Wilding verge on Park Road Rivenhall opposite Waterfall Cottages

The Parish Council entered into a contract with BDC to encourage wildflowers. Cutting undertaken by BDC and RPC each year. Unauthorised cutting must stop with immediate effect. Unauthorised Parking in Park Road should also stop. RPC to approach ECC to do spot planting. A section of verge to be removed from the contract and ask ECC to undertake the extra cutting.

Cllr J. Prime proposed to take out about 20 metres of land outside Lakeside Cottage from the contract. Cllr D. Hammond seconded. Cllr Wright asked for a recorded vote. F3 Cllr J. Macrae, J. Prime and D. Hammond – A3 Cllr J. Abbott, Cllr J Cairns, Cllr R. Wright. Cllr R. Turner, as Chairman, gave his casting vote in favour to have 20 metres removed from the ECC contract."

### Rivenhall and the Post Office Scandal



### Graham Ward, among others, Post Master of Rivenhall versus the Post Office

This was how the case of our own Post Master Graham Ward was reported in 2010 by our local newspapers. after Graham had to give up running our local Post Office in Rivenhall when he experienced problems with the Horizon system supplied by Fujitsu. The following is the headline from the local

### "A former sub-postmaster is threatening legal action against the Post Office."

More than a year after the Rivenhall post office was closed a former sub-postmaster is teaming up with other disgruntled postmasters to take on the Post Office.

Rivenhall's Oak Stores post office closed in September, 2008, forcing villagers to travel to Silver End or Witham. Graham Ward, former sub-postmaster and shop owner, saw equipment taken away by the Post Office after a dispute over an audit. In October 2005 he was suspended for an unexplained loss of £1,900, however, he was reinstated after a month.

Mr Ward said there were a number of disputes over financial irregularities and he blames the Post Office's Horizon computer system.

In 2010 he said there are about 50 (today there are over 1,000 cases in England alone and increasing everyday)

similar cases around the country and he is in touch with other postmasters and together they have engaged a solicitor. Some 12 years later in 2022 Mr Ward was finally able to give his account of what happened to the public inquiry.

To date a government inquiry has been hearing the witness statements of victims of the Post Office Horizon scandal. It saw 736 sub-postmasters and mistresses impacted after the Post Office's faulty accountancy software, Horizon, appeared to show the victims had money missing. It led to some postmasters being sent to prison or left them financially ruined and with a stain on their character.

One such victim was Mr Ward who ran the Rivenhall post office from 2002 to 2008 and the Feering post office from 2005 to 2008. In his witness statement to the inquiry, Mr Ward said he was accused of numerous shortfalls, the first costing him nearly £1,400 in 2005.

Each shortfall saw Mr Ward having to repay sums of money or had earnings removed from his wages. Following repeated shortfalls Mr Ward was also threatened with prosecution if he didn't pay the Post Office back. He was then audited and suspended before his job was terminated. Mr Ward says the experience cost him about £110,000. He said he was forced to sell his shop, which was also his home, and says the false claims also led to his marriage of 13 years breaking down. In the witness impact hearing, David Enright, who is representing many sub-postmasters, said: "He has been labelled a thief". The Post Office trainers told the new owners of the Post Office Mr Ward had stolen money from the Post Office.

"Mr Ward ended up with an Individual Voluntary Arrangement (IVA) for six years. He is no longer confident and does not feel worthy and good enough."

(An Individual Voluntary Arrangement is a formal, legally binding agreement between an individual and creditors to pay back debts over a specified period. It must be set up by a qualified professional, known as an insolvency practitioner.)

In a statement read by Mr Enright, Mr Ward added: "I would

like to think that the shortfalls were accidental and the Post Office didn't know how to get out of the situation, so let it run. I don't want Post Office Limited employees going to jail as that would not be fair on their kids. I don't want another family to go through what my family has gone through."

In response, a spokesman for the Post Office said: "Whilst it is not appropriate to comment on any individual cases, the Post Office is in no doubt of the human cost of the Horizon scandal and we are doing all we can to address this."

The inquiry's hearings enabled many of those who were most deeply affected by Post Office's past failings to voice their experiences. Their testimonies must and will, ensure all lessons are learned, so that such events can never happen again.

The Post Office have made interim payments of £100,000 to each of the majority of people whose convictions have been overturned and we are working on final settlements as swiftly as possible.

As Editor, I am pleased to say that our wonderful village store is now a thriving concern. I recently sent a package to Yorkshire using their Evri franchise and was amazed at how easy the process was. It is wonderful that I can now send parcels again from the Village store.

## The A12 to A120 widening project has been approved and work will begin in January 2024

The following statemen has been issued:

2 January 2024

### Planning decision is granted

We've been informed on 12 January 2024, that the Development Consent Order (DCO planning application for this scheme has been granted.

The granting of the DCO marks a significant step towards the future delivery of this important road project. The scale of our work here on the A12 will help improve safety for drivers, especially at

the junctions and slip roads, reduce traffic congestion by increasing capacity, and make journey times more reliable.

Our plans will see the current four-lane carriageway widen to six lanes (three in each direction). Other major improvements include the construction of two major bypasses at Rivenhall End and to the north of Kelvedon. These changes will help to take heavy goods vehicles away from minor roads and local villages. Junctions will also be upgraded to help traffic enter and exit the A12 safely. Public transport users will also benefit with access to additional bus stops, making their journeys quicker, safer, and more convenient.

Away from the road itself, a series of additional separate routes for walkers, cyclists and horse riders will also be created to help improve health and maximise the use of non-motorised forms of travel.

All our schemes from 2025 onwards are designed to provide an overall 'biodiversity net gain'. That means a real emphasis is placed on retaining existing habitats and ensuring a greater amount of biodiversity is left when the project is completed than what was there previously.

The A12 is one of the busiest roads in the east of England and provides a strategic connection between Chelmsford and Colchester, as well as the ports of Harwich and Felixstowe and nearby Stansted Airport. It provides the main south-west/northeast route through Essex and Suffolk, connecting Ipswich to London and the M25.

The section between Chelmsford at junction 19 (Boreham Interchange) to junction 25 at Marks Tey Interchange (near Colchester) carries high volumes of traffic, with up to 90,000 vehicles every day.

Heavy goods vehicles are between 9% and 12% of the traffic on this section due to its important freight connection, especially to Felixstowe and Harwich ports.

### The Work at Rivenhall End


### Here follows a brief summary of the work around Rivenhall End.

1. Rivenhall End will see the construction of a bypass which will run behind the old Rivenhall Hotel and the Matvchyn's office complex.

- 2. There will be no direct access to the A12 at Rivenhall as shown in the Diagram on the next page. To access the A12 traffic from Rivenhall and Silver End will travel under the Railway bridge and under the existing A12 bridge (where the road under the A12 Floods). Traffic will use a new section of road constructed to link with a new roundabout constructed near where the derelict Rivenhall Fox is located.
- 3. This new roundabout will take traffic either to the newly constructed all-ways junction at Witham North where it will be possible to travel North to Colchester and South to Chelmsford.
- 4. Traffic wanting to go to Kelvedon and Feering will use the old A12 which will become a local road maintained by Essex County Council.
- 5. Traffic for Tiptree and Braxted will turn left at a junction somewhere behind Matchyn's on the newly constructed link road (see map). This section will then take traffic towards Colemans Bridge. Colemans Bridge is not part of this scheme and will remain as it is now.
- 6. Access to Oak road by the Rivenhall Fox will be blocked off so that the houses from the railway bridge to the current A12 will be in a cul-de-sac.

Another topic of interest is the land opposite Henry Dixon Road up to the Railway Line. This area has been acquired by The Highways Agency and will be used to dump or acquire soil needed for backfill purposes during the construction phase. Of further interest to Rivenhall Residents is a proposed footbridge that will enable walkers to cross the A12 from North to South along the path known as Snivellers lane.

There is some indications that the land between the railway line and Rivenhall End at least on some drawings is being turned into a country park with some lakes, after completion of the A12 construction. While the land nearest to Rivenhall End is a designated flood plane. it is not unlikely that the land at the south end of Kelvedon opposite the Fire Headquarters could be designated for new housing. This could also be the case in Rivenhall End in the area between the new link road behind and the Matchyn's office complex so watch this space.

### Turning the pages of History Research by Tracy Scott

When I say 1966, most of you readers will think of England winning the World cup! Well we in Rivenhall had a great football team and in February 1966 Rivenhall Review report we found them fighting hard to maintain their position at the top of the league reached by them at the beginning of the year, which was a great credit to them.

Unfortunately, two matches, against Notley United and Little Waltham were postponed. Results of the other three matches were: Red Beret Res 2 – Rivenhall 11, New Villa Rovers 4 – Rivenhall 1. Rivenhall 15 – English Electric Res 2.

The Cup match between the boys and Notley at Rickstones Road on Sunday 6th February, resulted in a win for Rivenhall by 8 goals to 2. Notley scored within the first few minutes, then the Rivenhall side settled down and netted 5 goals by halftime. In the second half a fast game was played in a muddy pitch with the Rivenhall team chalking up a further 3 goals and Notley 1. In the last three

minutes P. Ridgewell was successful in saving a penalty taken by Notley.

Goal scorers were P. French 2, P. Stapleton 2, R. Kemp 2 and V. Succamore 2. (At the start of the next season of 66 they were promoted into the Second Division)

In the Review each month there was an article by Angus. I haven't found out who Angus was, but a large range of topics were cover and was very popular with the readers. In the Feb magazine of 66 his titled article was Mud and Muddle and I am sure many of you will think it was written this year and not 58 years ago!

Twice within a week at the end of January and beginning of February the main road near Rivenhall was blocked by accidents. Thrice within a few weeks there were fatal road accidents in and close to Rivenhall.

The columns of the Review are frequently drawing attention, not only to such accidents, but existing dangers which may well contribute to the cause. To repeat them, they come mainly under four headings – Slippery road surfaces with no 'grip' surplus water after rain, pot holes and mud!

Local residents have already complained strongly about the latter, and one threatened legal action in order to get the mud cleared from his frontage.

While it is appreciated that farm, road construction and building site vehicles and machinery cannot avoid bringing mud on the roads in present weather conditions, every effort should be made by those concerned to see that the mud is not allowed to build up so as to spread over the whole of the road surface, and the larger blobs should be removed immediately.

A Simple remedy for the surplus water is to drain it off by means of trenches – this used to be done, why is it not continued? Where this is not possible due to road-side banks, a suitable sump would provide adequate drainage.

Large puddles – particularly in parts of Oak Road and Rickstones Road – after a heavy rain, stay there for two to three days much to the discomfort of pedestrians and cyclist who are mercilessly splashed by fast moving vehicles. Also, quite naturally, they avoid going through the water, which often reaches the crown of the road, thus exposing themselves to even further danger, especially on bends. For that matter, the motorist is none too keen to

drive his newly cleaned car through the water and is inclined to swing out rather suddenly which can be highly dangerous. And to attempt to brake sharply on a both wet and muddy surface could be disastrous. Pot holes are a constant source of danger, particularly to scooter riders, and should certainly be filled in before they become too large.

What can be done about it? May we respectfully suggest that our elected local and County Councillors, who are in a position to deal with such matters, press the issue most strongly on the appropriate committees, and, if necessary, see that byelaws are enforced where applicable? In short, where read safety is concerned, which could do towards reducing the number of accidents.

Later in 1966 Angus reported 'the lid is off Rivenhall's top secret!' Duke of Edinburgh pays flying visit to Rivenhall: Speculative rumours, anything from transmitting radar waves to intercept nuclear missiles, to the Council holding it meetings, were being circulated regarding the use of those giant toad-stool like 65 feet high and 42 feet in diameter buildings on the outskirts of the village.

The Duke of Edinburgh landed by helicopter in a 2½ hour visit to inspect the one million pound station project which will be used as part of the Apollo project by which the Americans hope to land a man on the moon.

We have certainly come a long way since, say, 1890, when a course that would aid communication, was deemed necessary at Rivenhall. The Mutual Improvement Class, for that is what it was called, included in its curriculum, Bible lessons, Spelling, Writing and Geography. The class numbered 23 students.

Many inventions, communicative and otherwise, were thought to be impossible, by the layman long before our inventive brains really got cracking. It was said at first that, telegraphy, or communication by means of wires, 'just couldn't be'. I wonder what our past students – those who attended the Mutual Improvement Class – would think of the automated telegraph system and the communication that can be made trans-atlantic?

It is less than half a century since we were tickling a 'crystal' with a 'cats whisker' in an attempt to pick up a wavelength. Valve sets were then considered to be wonderful! What would Grandad have thought of the idea of a transistor radio whilst he was harvesting? One that he, indeed, could have put in his waistcoat pocket! Earth communication with the moon sound like so much moonshine to some, but will it be? It now seems well within possibility. The

site at Rivenhall, once used for agriculture and sheep farming, and later as an airfield for World War 2, is now the scene of an interplanetary giant satellite plan.

Rivenhall will now have a 'link' with Ascension Island, for that is where that station is to be shipped.

I hope you enjoyed this look back on 1966. The Rivenhall Review ran from 1961 to 1967 and are a great source of our local history, especially when the old timers of the village gave us insights of yesteryear of their own like Fred Pye and Jim Ager. Now we I think we need to get memories village life now before it changes again. A few months ago I said 'I was looking forward to looking back' and with the Village Hall becoming 100 this year I think it is an ideal time to do this.

Like me, many of you who read this magazine have roots in Rivenhall and the End going back many years if not centuries, so next month I am going in to detail how we can do this together and add to the photo records that the late Bill Prime built up.

## The Rivenhall Stained Glass and the Second World War plus a surprise recent discovery .

Many of you will have admired the stained glass in the East Window at St Mary's If you want to read all the details about this much admired feature of St. Mary's Rivenhall then you can visit https://www.stmarysrivenhall.co.uk/page9.html and read the full story.

Once the Germans started bombing Britain in 1940 and it was decided to use Rivenhall for a wartime airbase, it was clear there was a danger bombs might fall in the vicinity of St Mary's church. With great foresight it was decided to dismantle the East Window and put it into storage. Very soon afterwards a bomb fell into a field near the church so this could be thought of as "Divine Intervention".

However, on the south side of the Church near the Lectern is a window with what can only be described as odd bits of coloured glass.

This window was in fact shattered when the bomb fell and pieces of glass were scattered across the Churchyard. The rector at the time Rev. Swann was a resourceful chap so he

got the children from the School to come and collect all the pieces from the field.

This brings us to a recent discovery. We held a day to declutter the vestry and on looking through the top cupboards came upon a box containing pieces of coloured glass. This coloured glass which none of the current members of the church knew about are probably the pieces collected by the children during the war.

A very interesting find indeed.

### End to End Nature Care.

At our January evening meeting we enjoyed a very engaging and well attended talk on the subject of Bats, given by local expert Tim Sapsford. Although all bat species are legally protected in this country, Tim explained that bats are far from rare and the majority of older buildings, and some new ones, will harbour roosts at various different times of year. Different bat species have differing preferences when it comes to roost sites, some preferring natural settings, mainly trees, while others seem to show an active preference for buildings, sometimes even the type of building.

Bats, which are flying mammals of course, evolved more recently than birds, which are now generally accepted as being the living descendants of the dinosaurs. Tim explained that as bats' wings incorporate what we would think of as elongated finger bones they make bats far more agile fliers than birds and more effective aerial hunters. Some are not hunters at all though, with many tropical bats having evolved to eat fruit or nectar and in doing so have become important pollinators for plants such as bananas (though commercial bananas are propagated and do not require pollination). Then there are the vampire bats, 3 South and Central American species which specialise in feeding exclusively on blood.

There are 17 species of bat known to inhabit the British Isles and 10 of them are resident in Essex. The vast majority of Essex bats are Pipistrelles, mainly Common and Soprano. One way of finding them and seeking to identify which species they are is to use a 'bat detector' which can hear their ultrasonic calls (mainly used for echo-location, which most bats use to navigate and hunt in the dark), hence the Soprano Pipistrelle has a higher-pitched call than the Common. That said, some groups of bats are very difficult to tell apart even by their calls, and Tim explained how the Essex Bat Group are licensed to handle bats in order to determine species and condition, and in some cases to place small rings on their legs, as is often done for birds. Recovery of such ringed bats has revealed that they often fly considerable distances and it is not for bats to cross the North Sea between Britain and mainland Europe, travelling a far as Russia.

We have lots more activity coming up. In February we have our quiz night and in March a talk on another mammal, this time just a single species: the Badger. I'm sure it will be as stimulating as the Bats talk. These winter indoor meetings are on the third Wednesday of each month; details below. They are held in Silver End Con-

gregational Church, Silver Street, commencing at 8pm. All are welcome for donation of  $\pounds 2$  per head, which includes tea/coffee and biscuits in the interval.

Also in March we may be joining in a quiz with some other Essex natural history groups, which will hopefully be fun. Then, in April, our series of summer (yes, summer!) activities commences with our usual Cowslip count near Tarecroft Wood. 




